## How Can Rural Wellington Municipalities Help?

- Keep the social face of the issue at the forefront
- Realize that \$ spent on support for unhoused residents reduces other municipal and regional services
- Stay informed and in communication with social service supports. Share information with municipal staff, businesses, service clubs, faith groups.
  - Sanguen Health Van, RAAM Van, Legal Clinic Van, Family Health Teams/RWCT, Food Banks, Community Resource Centre
- Offer training to outline how the community can support these efforts. Involve those with lived experience in this training.
- Take every opportunity to build compassion in the community through your municipal communications.
- Work collaboratively with Wellington County Municipalities with similar issues (TWN)
- Consider alternate uses of municipal resources to support unhoused residents
  - Access to potable water, garbage cans, sharps containers, access to warm spaces, access to rec centre/washrooms/showers
- Advocate at all levels of Government and with local businesses for a Living Wage \$20.90
  - \$43472 or approx. \$31700 after tax per year
  - Housing Rental rates: \$1200-1800/month=\$14400-\$21600 per year
  - o \$1440/month to cover utilities, food, gas, auto, insurance, medications etc
  - Note: Max social assistance rates for a single individual is \$343 basic needs and \$390 for shelter allowance =\$733 , Ontario Disability Support Program \$1308/month
- Develop or revise emergency preparedness plans to include unhoused residents. (emergencies: pandemic, climate, extreme weather)
- Advocate for a Guaranteed Basic Income, estimated at \$17000/year. This would cut poverty rates in half (2021)
